# **TARGA HIGH COUNTRY EVENT OVERVIEW**

## **11 – 13 FEBRUARY 2022**

Less than three hours from Melbourne, TARGA High Country is based on top of Victoria's most popular Ski Resort, Mt Buller, some 1800 meters above sea level offering a unique experience to competitors.

In summer, the road to the summit masquerades as one of the most exciting hill climbs in the country and provides the gateway to all stages over the three days of competition.

Competitors will take part in three high-octane days of racing, travelling through the High-Country regions including heading out to the Whitfield, Euroa and Eildon areas.

Major highlights of the event will be a revamped Mansfield Street stage followed by TARGAFest in the main street of Mansfield on Saturday afternoon followed by the official finish with one of the world's largest champagne showers on Sunday afternoon on Mount Buller.

## **SAFE SPECTATING GUIDELINES**

TARGA High Country is conducted under the rules and regulations of Motorsport Australia.

The event takes place on public tarmac roads, within the High Country and Mount Buller regions. TARGA uses designated sections of road, closed for the purpose of the timed competition. These designated stages are known as TARGA stages and their closure is authorised by the relevant government agency, as well as the Police.

The success of TARGA High Country relies heavily on the co-operation of all individuals. It is important that all spectators respect, listen and follow any instructions given from event organisers and officials. It is vitally important to ensure spectators are safe at all times when watching a TARGA event. Our officials and the Police will not allow a stage to start until all spectators are positioned in what they consider to be a safe location.

All spectators are required to be on the TARGA stage and in their viewing area prior to the road being officially closed, and may not leave until the 'road open' vehicle has passed through. There is to be no parking on the closed roads.

It is important that spectators are aware and consider the fact that they can be on a TARGA stage for up to six hours, especially those with young children.

TARGA runs to the minute, so no access will be given from either end of the stage during the running of the stage.

It is important to be aware that cars under competition conditions can lose control and leave the defined road at any time. Spectators must not stand in any areas which are not authorised or which are contrary to the advice of the organisers and officials. It is important that spectators can react to an approaching vehicle at all times.

The officials are positioned on the TARGA stages to ensure the safety of all spectators. TARGA asks spectators to respond to all requests from officials and TARGA staff. Spectators may be asked to relocate; this is for good reason and with the safety of all in mind.

Spectators must not emulate TARGA competitors. This only reflects poorly on TARGA Tasmania and motorsport as a whole.

Pets are not recommended in public spectating areas. If a spectator elects to bring their dog, it needs to be kept under control and on a lead at all times.

Children must be supervised during the TARGA stage.

TARGA asks that all spectators keep clear of all controls (start and finish points), including from the timing marker to the control area. Control officials may ask spectators to move if obstructing their ability to perform their job. If a spectator does wish to see a control point, then TARGA requests standing well back and responding to any instruction given by the officials.

## **RISK WARNINGS, DISCLAIMER AND INDEMNITY SIGNS**

Motorsport Activities are inherently dangerous recreational activities and there is significant risk of injury, disability or death.

If you do not wish to be exposed to such risks, then you should not attend at or participate in Motorsport Activities.

**WARNING:** If you participate in these activities your rights to sue the supplier under the Competition and Consumer Act 2010 (Cth)\* if you are killed or injured because the activities were not supplied with due care and skill or were not reasonably fit for their purpose, are excluded, restricted or modified in the way set out in or on this sign.

In exchange for being able to attend or participate in the Motorsport Activities, you agree:

- to release the Confederation of Australian Motor Sport Ltd trading as Motorsport Australia (Motorsport Australia) and the Entities\*\* to the extent that any or all of them are providing recreational services from all liability for:
  - a. your death;
  - b. any physical or mental injury (including the aggravation, acceleration or recurrence of such an injury);
  - c. the contraction, aggravation or acceleration of a disease;
  - d. the coming into existence, the aggravation, acceleration or recurrence of any other condition, circumstance, occurrence, activity, form of behaviour, course of conduct or state of affairs:
    - i. that is or may be harmful or disadvantageous to you or the community; or
    - ii. that may result in harm or disadvantage to you or the community,
- howsoever arising from your participation in or attendance at the Motor Sport Activities;
- to indemnify and hold harmless and keep indemnified Motorsport Australia and each of the Entities to the maximum extent permitted by law in respect of any claim by any person; and
- to attend at or participate in the Motorsport Activities at your own risk.

NOTE: The change to your rights, as set out in or on this sign, does not apply if your death or injury is due to reckless conduct on the supplier's part.

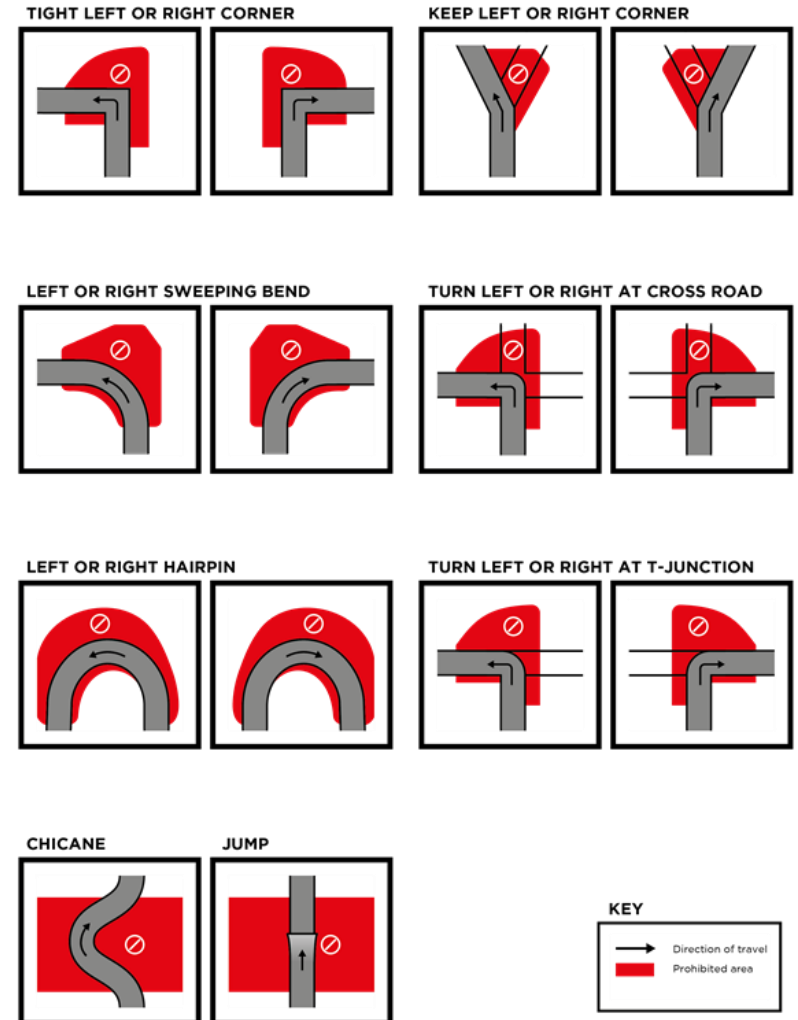
"Motorsport Activities" means any motorsport activities or recreational services which are permitted or approved by Motorsport Australia.

"Reckless Conduct" means conduct where the supplier of the recreational services is aware, or should reasonably have been aware, of a significant risk that the conduct could result in personal injury to another person and engages in the conduct despite the risk and without adequate justification. See section 139A of the Competition and Consumer Act 2010.

## SAFETY TAPE STANDARDS / NO STANDING AREAS

Safe public spectating areas are marked by yellow safety tape. Spectators are asked to view the TARGA stages from behind this tape. There is to be no spectating where blue/white striped or red/white striped tape is marked.

Please refer to the TARGA High Country Safety Tape Standards below:



**Targa High Country  
Safety Tape Standards**

<b>TAPE A</b>	 Blue/white, 75mm wide 'drivers' tape - no spectators behind this tape
<b>TAPE B</b>	 Red/white, 75mm wide - no spectators behind this tape
<b>TAPE C</b>	 Yellow, 75mm wide spectators permitted to stand behind this tape

## TARGA COMPETITION RUNNING ORDER

TARGA is a unique tarmac rally, where the cars run slowest to fastest. The cars start at thirty second intervals and race against the clock, and themselves with the winner being the fastest car over all stages.

TARGA competition numbers are based on the competition category. The first number determines the category. The category is determined by the year or the vehicle.

This means the fastest and higher profile latest model cars will come through each TARGA stage last. It is important that spectators remain patient, as the cars will get faster and faster.

The TARGA Tour cars will come through in close-knit packets of around ten cars, led by a TARGA Tour Leader. After this, the competition cars will come through in approximately thirty second intervals, unless of course a faster car is passing at the spectating area. Spectators may experience the thrill of passing, normally only seen on a racetrack.

The TARGA cars will run through the stages in the following order:

101 - 249 Corporate & Manufacturer TARGA tour

250 – 349 TARGA Tour

350 - 399 TSD Trophy

401 – 449 Thoroughbred Trophy

450 – 499 GT Sports Trophy

550 - 649 Classic

650 – 699 Classic GT

750 - 799 Early Modern 2

801 – 849 GT Production

901 - 949 GT Outright

950 – 998 GT Production

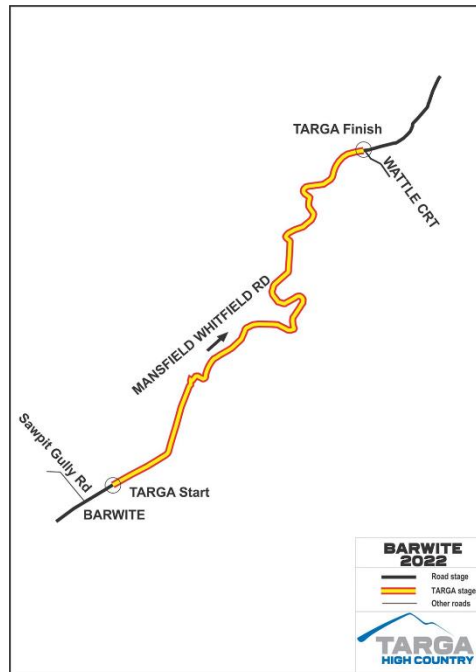

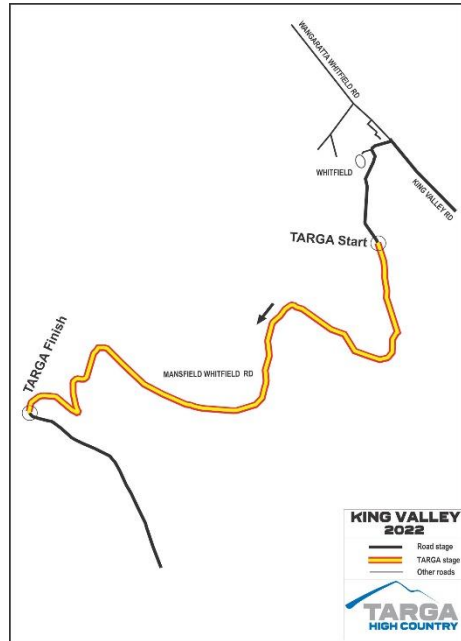
